Founded in 1990, BSS Endeavours to present The finest programme of summer courses in Egyptology and Ancient world history, Archaeology, languages, And literature, available in the United Kingdom.

In 2023, we are offering 12 intensive courses on hieroglyphs, hieratic, Demotic, Coptic, and other aspects of ancient Egyptian archaeology, history, and culture, as well as courses on the ancient Near East and the Americas. In addition to our normal 5-day summer courses, in the spring the Egyptian hieroglyphs taster day is back by popular demand. We are continuing online courses over weekends to accommodate participant work schedules. #### **1-DAY SPRING COURSE**

#### A TASTE OF HIEROGLYPHS

Course Director: Dr Bill Manley

# This course, held online via Zoom, will also be available on video recording afterwards.

For those of you intrigued by the possibility of learning how to read Egyptian hieroglyphs and perhaps wondering whether to take the plunge, this single-day course will show you the basics behind reading the ancient Egyptian language and script, and also give you a taste of the way we do things at Bloomsbury Summer School. *A Taste of Hieroglyphs* assumes you have no prior experience in the subject — but, through a series of presentations and reading sessions, by the end of a memorable day we will have shown you how to read the inscriptions on some pharaonic monuments preserved and on display in worldfamous museums.

# Secourse description: 26 Mar (Online only)

#### **1-DAY SPRING COURSE**

#### A TASTE OF DEMOTIC

Course Director: **Dr Franziska Naether** (University of Leipzig)

This course, held online via Zoom, will also be available on video recording afterwards.

Come delve into the Demotic script! This 1-day course offers a brief introduction to this cursive form of Egyptian writing, starting with the Rosetta Stone. For roughly 1200 years (between the 7th century BCE and 5th century CE), Demotic was used to write a late phase of the Egyptian language often referred to as 'the language of Cleopatra'. Although the script is challenging to read, Franziska will take you through step by step. Your efforts will be rewarded with glimpses into daily life, from temple documents and shopping lists to literary and magical texts. You will become familiar with the alphabetic signs, basic grammar, and syntax, and soon be reading simple but important words. The day will conclude with a reading of Demotic on Egyptian papyri.

**NB:** A Taste of Demotic assumes you have no prior experience in the subject. However, the script is challenging and you will glean more from the class if you have a basic familiarity with Egyptian hieroglyphs. We recommend our Taste of Hieroglyphs course (25 March). #### **2-DAY SPRING COURSE**

#### "BUT HIS OWN MIND GUIDED HIM": VISUAL ART AND ARTISTIC PRACTICE IN ANCIENT EGYPT

Course Director: **Dr Elizabeth Frood** (University of Oxford)

# This course, held online via Zoom, will also be available on video recording afterwards.

The quotation in the course title comes from an artist's signature in a 20th Dynasty tomb in

Egypt's south. It speaks to one of the tensions examined in this short course — that between tradition and innovation — as well as issues relating to the experience of artists and personal inspiration. Your Course Director will explore with you different themes in Egyptian visual art, encompassing, for example, the relationships of writing and art, gender and representation, and graffiti art. Richly illustrated lectures will introduce you to key issues and material, while discussion sessions will be designed to allow you to delve deeper into sources and explore their implications.

#### 4-DAY SPRING COURSE (SPLIT ACROSS 2 WEEKENDS)

#### EGYPT REINVENTED: DISCOVERING GRAECO-ROMAN EGYPT

Course Director: **Dr Luigi Prada** (Uppsala University)

# This course, held online via Zoom, will also be available on video recording afterwards.

It is often through the rich heritage of the Graeco–Roman Period that many of us become captivated by Egypt's ancient civilisation: think of the best-preserved temples, such as those at Edfu or Philae, or great historical figures, such as Alexander the Great or Cleopatra. Yet, many of us often know relatively little about this fascinating period. This course — which is intended for both students of ancient Egypt and of the classical world — offers a full introduction to this period. Join Luigi in exploring the manifold identities and aspects of Graeco-Roman Egypt, spanning its archaeology, art history, textual culture, religion, and much more. You will discover its complex reality, where century-old Egyptian traditions and ways of life were reinvented through contact with the civilisations of the Greeks and Romans.

#### **5-DAY SUMMER COURSES**

#### HIERATIC: READING HORUS AND SETH, LOVE POEMS, AND MORE

Course Director: **Dr Luigi Prada** (Uppsala University)

#### This course, held in person and online via Zoom, will also be available on video recording afterwards.

Following the success of last year's introduction to Hieratic, Luigi is offering a new class this summer, giving students the opportunity to read more texts in the original hieratic, the cursive script of pharaonic Egypt. We will read together texts in both Middle and Late Egyptian, beginning with one of ancient Egypt's literary masterpieces, 'The Contendings of Horus and Seth'. Other readings will include New Kingdom love poems, and a selection of other texts. The course includes initial refreshers to reading hieratic and Late Egyptian, and can be attended also by students who did not follow the previous course. Participants are expected to have knowledge - minimum one year's study - of hieroglyphic Middle Egyptian. Sessions to observe original artefacts at the British Museum and Petrie Museum will also be included.

#### VISUAL CULTURE OF THE ANCIENT AMERICAS: FROM ROCK ART TO QUIPUS AND CODICES

Course Director: **Dr Elizabeth Baquedano** (University College London)

This course, held in person and online via Zoom, will also be available on video recording afterwards.

This course looks at the indigenous cultures of the Americas through the lens of visual culture from 500 BCE to the 16th century CE and beyond. Join us for a fascinating journey through the rich artefactual evidence, including materials of manufacture, stylistic changes, and elaborate iconography and symbolism. Examine with Elizabeth multimedia objects that combine different materials and different techniques and the reasons behind these artistic choices and the multiplicity of ideas they signified. This course will be approached from an array of disciplines: archaeology, archeoastronomy, art, and anthropology. Together with your Course Director and special guest lecturers, you will enjoy learning about the wealth of visual culture from North America, Mesoamerica, and South America.

#### **5-DAY SUMMER COURSES**

#### READING HIEROGLYPHS: 'ALL THAT IS WRITTEN IN THIS BOOK'

Course Co-Directors: **Dr José-Ramón Pérez-Accino** (Complutense University of Madrid) and **Dr Bill Manley** 

# This course will be held in person. For the online option, see page 11.

As usual, BSS is offering a brand new course for those who love to experience pharaonic Egypt's culture at first hand by reading ancient texts. This time, to mark the publication of Bill's new book, we will be exploring the language and ideas of some of the world's earliest surviving literature, including the wisdom of 'The Loyalist Teaching' and 'The Teaching of Kagemni'.

Happily, this year's *Reading Hieroglyphs* course makes a return to our London classrooms. In response to ever-increasing demand, however, the same course will run online, on 24 – 28 July.

**NB:** Our Reading Hieroglyphs courses assume you already have a good reading knowledge of Egyptian hieroglyphic texts. Normally we expect you to have taken both Hieroglyphs for Beginners (first stage) and Hieroglyphs: The Next Step (second stage) at BSS beforehand. As a rule of thumb, before you come along you should be comfortable reading all of the texts in How to Read Egyptian Hieroglyphs (see Recommended reading on page 4). However, do not worry about the intensity of this course: throughout the week there will be plenty of time for your own work and for questions and answers with your tutors.

#### **HIEROGLYPHS: THE NEXT STEP**

Course Co-Directors: **Dr José-Ramón Pérez-Accino** (Complutense University of Madrid) and **Dr Bill Manley** 

# This course will be held in person. For online options contact BSS.

We are delighted once again to offer our secondstage course in Egyptian hieroglyphs. José-Ramón and Bill aim to show you The Next Step, which builds on the knowledge and skills you acquired on the course Hieroglyphs for Beginners. In a series of practical sessions, you will be introduced to increasingly elaborate monuments, including those made for kings as well as officials. In this way, you will develop a more sophisticated appreciation of hieroglyphic writing and the language, including ways of talking about the king and the gods; ways of talking about the past, present, and future; and how to make negative statements. Through the week you will enrich your understanding of different kinds of monuments and expand your knowledge of Middle Egyptian.

**NB:** You need not have taken the course Hieroglyphs for Beginners at BSS beforehand, but The Next Step assumes you do have some experience in reading Egyptian hieroglyphic inscriptions. As a general guide, you should already be able to read a basic offering-formula, and cope with the language of the monuments on pages 46 and 48 of the course book. That said, do not worry about the intensity of the course: there will be plenty of time for supervised reading and for contact with your tutor.

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#### **5-DAY SUMMER COURSES**

#### HATSHEPSUT AND SENENMUT: POWER AND PERSONALITY IN EGYPT'S 18TH DYNASTY

Course Director: **Dr Campbell Price** (University of Manchester)

# This course, held in person and online via Zoom, will also be available on video recording afterwards.

Hatshepsut's reign of two decades in the 15th Century BCE was in some ways the most unconventional in pharaonic history. Her high official Senenmut played an important role in presenting her kingship, while he and her other officials commemorated themselves in both traditional and innovative ways. Join Campbell to explore his new research on the interaction of sculpture, sacred landscapes, and the historical memory of the ancient Egyptians themselves on this fascinating course. Students will be able to take an in-depth and uniquely insightful examination of the textual and artefactual evidence for monumental expression of royal and entrepreneurial power during this extraordinary period.

#### ANCIENT PERSIA AND THE HEBREW BIBLE

Course Director: **Prof. Lloyd Llewellyn-Jones** (University of Cardiff)

#### This course, held in person and online via Zoom, will also be available on video recording afterwards.

In this exciting historical-archaeological study, we will explore ancient Persian history and culture in the context of biblical accounts, enlarging upon this connection in discussions of numerous topics surrounding Persian rulers, seats of government, cultural norms, and religion. The course offers a broad survey of the Hebrew biblical literature and recent archaeological findings in Iran, Israel, and beyond. Focus will be given to several key Biblical texts, including Isaiah, Ezra and Nehemiah, and Esther, as well as to the Jewish community of Persian Egypt. Attention will also be drawn to the way in which much of the Hebrew bible received its editing in the Persian period and how 'Persianisms' found their way into many of its books. This course will also include a visit to the British Museum's new exhibition. Luxurv and Power: From Persia to Greece, led by the Course Director.

#### **5-DAY SUMMER COURSE**

#### READING COPTIC: APOCRYPHA AND APOCRYPHAL

Course Director: Dr Bill Manley

#### This course, held in person and online via Zoom, will also be available on video recording afterwards.

Our brand new course for old friends and newcomers alike is designed to build on your skills in reading Sahidic Coptic and so enhance your understanding and appreciation of Egyptian culture. As ever, you will be invited to study different aspects of the language and apply them in reading, using notes specially written for BSS. This time we will concentrate on two collections of less familiar texts linked to The Bible, the Apocrypha, and the apocryphal gospels, including an impressive 7th century edition of 'The Sayings of Jesus Ben Sirach' in The British Museum and a slightly later edition of 'The Life of Joseph the Carpenter' from the celebrated library of Shenoute's White Monastery.

**NB:** You need not have taken the introductory course Coptic: A Course for Beginners at BSS, but Reading Coptic assumes you do have some experience in reading Coptic texts — as a rule of thumb you should be comfortable reading a short narrative including the past tense and circumstantial forms. However, do not worry about the intensity: there will be plenty of time for supervised practice and for questions and answers with your tutor. If you have taken Reading Coptic with us previously, you will find all-new content in this latest course.


#### READING HIEROGLYPHS: 'ALL THAT IS WRITTEN IN THIS BOOK'

#### **BSS DIRECTOR**

Kathryn E. Piquette received her PhD in Egyptology from University College London (UCL), specialising in early Egyptian writing and art. She is currently a Senior Researcher at the UCL Centre for Digital Humanities where she has lectured on digital approaches to cultural heritage and works as an imaging specialist for UCL Advanced Imaging Consultants. Kathryn took over directorship of BSS in 2019, having directed and coordinated several BSS courses over the past two decades. A longstanding member of the Friends of the Petrie Museum, Kathryn has served as Student Representative, Membership Officer, and is now a member of the Board of Trustees. She is also a member of the Egypt Exploration Society. Her archaeological fieldwork includes excavation in Jordan (Petra) and Egypt (Wadi Natrun, Hierakonpolis, Giza), and work as advanced digital imaging specialist at Qubbet el-Hawa, Deir Anba Hadra, Philae Temple, the C2 Project: Royal Cache Wadi survey, and several other projects in Egypt. Among her publications is the Open Access monograph An Archaeology of Art and Writing: Early Egyptian labels in context (2018) with supporting online database, and the freely available co-edited volume Writing as Material Practice: Substance, surface and medium (2013). She is also working on co-edited volumes on the Narmer Palette. Palermo Stone, and the Shabago Stone.

#### **BSS COURSE DIRECTORS**

Elizabeth Baquedano is an Honorary Senior Lecturer at the UCL Institute of Archaeology, where she also obtained her PhD. She was elected Fellow of the Society of Antiquaries, London in 2021. Elizabeth gives regular gallery talks and lectures at the British Museum and around the world. Some of her publications include *Tezcatlipoca: Trickster and supreme deity* (2014) and *Aztec Sculpture* (1994), chapters in *Los Animales y el recinto sagrado de Tenochtitlan* (2022) and *Living with the Dead: Mortuary ritual in Mesoamerica* (2011). She is also co-editor of *Birds and Beasts of Ancient Mesoamerica* (forthcoming 2023).

**Elizabeth Frood** is Associate Professor of Egyptology in the Faculty of Asian and Middle Eastern Studies, University of Oxford. Born in Aotearoa, New Zealand, she received her first degrees from the University of Auckland and her doctorate from Oxford. She writes on aspects of nonroyal self-presentation and display, particularly for the late New Kingdom and Third Intermediate Period. Elizabeth co-directs the Karnak Graffiti Project in collaboration with the Centre Franco-Égyptien d'Étude des Temples de Karnak. She is the author of *Biographical Texts from Ramessid Egypt* (2007) and of articles on topics ranging from potters to religion.

# BSS COURSE DIRECTORS (CONTINUED)

Lloyd Llewellyn-Jones holds the Chair in Ancient History at Cardiff University and is the Director of the Ancient Iran Programme for the British Institute of Persian Studies. His books include: King and Court in Ancient Persia, Ctesias' History of Persia: Tales of the Orient; The Culture of Animals in Antiquity; and Designs on the Past: How Hollywood created the ancient world. His book Persians: The Age of the Great Kings has been translated into over a dozen languages. Lloyd is one of the most significant international names in the fields of Ancient History and Persian Studies and has spent extensive time in Iran, where his books have received Farsi translation. Future publications include The Cleopatras: Egypt's forgotten gueens for Wildfire Books.

**Bill Manley** is a best-selling author who has taught at Bloomsbury Summer School since the 1990s. He was formerly Senior Curator for Ancient Egypt at National Museums Scotland and taught Egyptology and Coptic at the Universities of Glasgow, Liverpool, and London. He works with the C2 Project: Royal Cache Wadi survey, is Honorary President of Egyptology Scotland, a contributor to the Coptic Magical Papyri Project, and Co-Director of Egiptología Complutense. Bill has spoken at several international book festivals, including The Sunday Times Literary Festival, and his latest book, *The Oldest Book in the World*, will be published by Thames and Hudson in June. **Franziska Naether** (Saxon Academy of Sciences and Humanities) is adjunct assistant professor at Leipzig University in Germany (Egyptological Institute / Egyptian Museum) and Stellenbosch University in South Africa (Department of Ancient Studies). She is head of the Digital Rosetta Stone Project and has published widely on ancient religion, magic, and literature. Her other research interests include the history and society of Graeco-Roman Egypt, Museology, reception of Egypt, and Digital Humanities.

José-Ramón Pérez-Accino is Senior Lecturer in Egyptology and Ancient History at the Complutense University of Madrid. He specialises in Egyptian literature, texts, and the intellectual world of the ancient Egyptians. In addition to being Co-Director of Egiptología Complutense with Bill Manley, he conducts fieldwork in Egypt, including at Ehnasya el-Medina (Herakleopolis Magna) and Western Thebes, where he is now Co-Director of the C2 Project: Royal Cache Wadi survey. He has taught Egyptology for the University of London's Birkbeck College and University College London. He has directed many highly acclaimed courses for BSS, often regarded by our students as some of the most challenging and thoughtful courses we offer.

## BSS COURSE DIRECTORS (CONTINUED)

Luigi Prada is Assistant Professor of Egyptology at Uppsala University. He was educated in both Egyptology and Classics, firstly in Italy and then Oxford. He works primarily on textual and culturalhistorical studies, with a focus on the later phases of Egypt's history and language(s) / scripts. Previously, he has held academic positions in Germany, Denmark, and the UK, where he remains a Research Associate in Egyptology at Oxford. He is also active in the field, both in Egypt as Assistant Director of the Oxford Expedition to Elkab (Ashmolean Museum), and in the Sudan, and is the president of the Society of Friends of the Museo Egizio in Turin.

**Campbell Price** is Curator of Egypt and Sudan at the University of Manchester's Manchester Museum, one of the UK's largest Egyptology collections. He has a PhD in Egyptology from the University of Liverpool, where he is an Honorary Research Fellow. His research focuses on elite monuments of the First Millennium BCE. particularly on sculpture, and the representation of ancient Egypt in museums. Recent publications include: Pocket Museum: Ancient Egypt (2018); Golden Mummies of Egypt: Interpreting identities from the Graeco-Roman Period (2020); Perfected Forms: Non-royal temple sculpture in the Egyptian Late Period (forthcoming); and Senenmut: His life and afterlife (forthcoming AUC). Campbell is Chair of Trustees of the Egypt Exploration Society.

Anna Stevens is an archaeologist who specialises in the study of urban and non-elite life in ancient Egypt. She has worked at sites including Amarna, Sesebi, Amara West and in the Dakhleh Oasis. Her publications include *Private Religion at Amarna, Akhenaten's Workers,* and the multi-authored *Amarna: A Guide to the Ancient City of Akhetaten.* She is Lecturer in Archaeology at Monash University, Assistant Director of the Amarna Project (University of Cambridge) and in 2023 will be Simpson Visitor Professor in Egyptology at the American University in Cairo.

#### RECENT DISCOVERIES IN THE ROYAL CACHE WADI ON LUXOR'S WEST BANK

Speaker: **Dr José-Ramón Pérez-Accino** (Complutense University of Madrid)

We are pleased to invite Dr José-Ramón Pérez-Accino to lead our summer study YVn on the Royal Cache Wadi. It is here, on the West Bank at Luxor, that a key chapter in the life history of the Valley of the Kings came to a close 500 years after it began as a royal necropolis. At the end of the New Kingdom, the mummified bodies of Egyptian rulers and some members of the royal court were deposited in a tomb in a wadi or bay in the cliffs near the temple at Deir el-Bahari. The find of this 'Royal Cache' in 1881 was the first spectacular discovery of Egyptian archæology to be covered by the mass media. It has since been assumed that this so-called wadi is otherwise largely devoid of archaeological remains. However, since 2017, the C2 Project: Royal Cache Wadi survey has revealed new evidence for religious activity prior to the re-burial of the kingsží j ZZchž VcY di] ZgodnVa[Vb an b Zb WZgh. These exciting findings change significantly our understanding of the area and especially the history of the Valley of the Kings.

The four lectures include:

- 1. Not the Last Journey: The re-burial of the kings at the end of the New Kingdom
- 2. The Night of Tasting Fear: A discovery in the mountains
- 3. The Forgotten Valley: The C2 Project
- 4. Work in Progress: Lines of research and future plans

In addition to hearing four fascinating lectures, you will have plenty of opportunity to ask questions and to socialise with the speaker over morning and afternoon refreshments.

This is a unique opportunity to engage in a 10-session course taught by a renowned academic on location in Egypt. Daily visits to ancient monuments enhance the learning experience. Our Course Director accompanies the site visits, and is on hand throughout to answer questions, discuss, and socialise with you.

Our 12 BSS in Egypt courses to date have been directed by Prof. Barry Kemp, Mr John Romer, Dr Robert Morkot, Dr Stephen Harvey, Dr Peter Lacovara, Dr Bill Manley, and Dr Bernadette Brady. We base ourselves in one hotel for the entire course. Thus far, our courses have taken place in Cairo, Minya, Sohag, Luxor, and Aswan.

This year we are thrilled to be returning to Amarna after more than a decade, for another course — this time with **Dr Anna Stevens**, **Deputy Director of excavations at the site of Amarna.** The course will commence with a museum day in Cairo to see artefacts associated with Amarna. Classes will take place in our hotel, the MG Nefertiti, and our related site visits will include the locations of the Aten temples, royal palaces, the house of the sculptor Thutmose, workshops, tombs, and more. Group meals provide an opportunity to discuss the course and site visits, and to socialise with the Course Director and fellow students.

# THE PETRIE MUSEUM OF EGYPTIAN ARCHAEOLOGY

The Petrie Museum of Egyptian Archaeology here at UCL plays an important role in the BSS programme, whether virtually or in person. It houses more than 80,000 objects from the Nile Valley. Most of these are from the excavations of William Matthew Flinders Petrie, the 'Father of Egyptian Archæology', during the late 19th and early 20th century. Petrie became the first Edwards Professor of Egyptology at UCL in 1893 and the college subsequently acquired his collection, which, with that of Amelia Edwards, forms the core of the museum as we know it today.

The collection can claim a number of 'firsts', among them the oldest known woven garment, monumental sculpture, calendar, and gynaecological papyrus. It also has the largest collection of Egyptian pots, Middle Kingdom papyri, weights, and Roman Period mummy portraits outside Egypt. The collection is uniquely important because much of it comes from documented excavations, providing an unparalleled insight into the way ancient people lived and died in the Nile Valley. This ensures that the Petrie Museum remains a valuable resource for today's scholars, students, and public alike.

The Petrie Museum was the first museum in the world to make its entire catalogue available for study via its online database. Its commitment to accessibility was publicly recognised by the highly prestigious Museums and Heritage Award for Excellence, which the museum won in 2005. The museum celebrated its centenary in 2015 with a fine exhibition *Characters and Collections* and an accompanying book, downloadable for free here: www.uclpress.co.uk/products/82987.

New Friends of the Petrie Museum are always warmly welcomed. Friends are invited to attend monthly (in person and online) lectures and object-handling seminars, as well as a host of special events including study days, book launches, book auctions, parties, day trips, and tours to Egypt and museums around the world. Friends also have access to the excellent Edwards Egyptology Library in the UCL Institute of Archaeology. Even if you live miles from the Petrie Museum, it is well worth becoming a Friend in order to support one of the world's most important collections of Egyptian antiquities. #### THE BSS BURSARY SCHEME

Bloomsbury Summer School runs a modest bursary scheme, offering unfilled places on our spring and summer courses to those who would find it challenging to pay our course fees. We are usually able to offer a small number of applicants places for about 30% off the full fee (discount applies to 4- and 5-day courses only).

You need only email a brief statement of your situation and wishes, putting your chosen courses in order of preference. You may apply for as many courses as you like. After you have sent in an application, try to keep your diary clear of important engagements for the relevant week(s). The process of awarding bursary places usually begins at the end of February for spring courses and end of May for summer courses.

There is of course no guarantee that a bursary place on a given course will arise at all; even when bursary places do become available, they sometimes do so rather late in the day, as a consequence of last-minute student cancellation.


